



<u>Prescribing of Adhesive Barrier Rings, Seals and Washers</u> <u>Position Statement</u>

Hertfordshire and West Essex ICB recommends maximum monthly quantities, dependent on the stoma type, for the prescribing of barrier rings, seals and washers.

Recommendations

Stoma Type	Daily Quantity*	Maximum Monthly Quantity to be Prescribed**
Ileostomy	0.5 - 1	30
Colostomy	1-3	90
Urostomy	0.5 - 1	30

^{*}Daily quantity of 0.5 indicates use on alternate days

- New patients using this product should only be prescribed barrier rings, seals or washers after an assessment by a stoma care nurse.
- If ordering in excess of recommended quantities, patients should be referred to their local stoma care nurse for review.

Rationale

- When the stoma bag is changed, the barrier ring, seal or washer will be removed at the same time. Therefore, a new one is required at each bag change.
- Patients with an ileostomy or urostomy usually change their stoma bag daily or on alternate days, therefore requiring 15-30 of these products each month.
- Patients with a colostomy may change their stoma bag up to three times a day, so could require 30-90 of these products each month.
- Using more than the recommended amount could indicate a stoma related issue that requires a clinical review.

Background

- Barrier rings, seals or washers stretch and fit around the stoma, adhering to the patient's skin and stoma
 appliance. They are usually made of hydrocolloid or silicone which ensures fluid is taken away from the
 skin due to its high absorbency properties.
- Used to prevent leakage and protect peristomal skin, which could be caused by either a difficult sited stoma (e.g. in a skin crease) or flat stomas (i.e. stomas flush to the peristomal skin).
- Barrier rings, seals or washers are not routinely required for all patients with a stoma.
- There is no clinical evidence to support a preferred formulary choice, and these products are comparably priced.

^{**}Quantity required may be considerably more if used around a fistula site. This should be communicated by the local stoma care nurse





• The choice of product is generally governed by the type of problem causing the leak. The stoma care nurse is therefore best placed to advise on the appropriate product for the patient, taking into account the stoma type and skin condition.
