



Prescribing of Adhesive Sprays / Lotions to Aid Bag Adhesion Position Statement

Hertfordshire and West Essex ICB <u>does not</u> support the prescribing of adhesive sprays/lotions to aid bag adhesion.

Recommendations

- Adhesive sprays/lotions to aid bag adhesion should not be prescribed.
- New and existing patients should be referred to their local stoma care nurse for review if they are experiencing problems with bag adherence.

Rationale

- The use of an adhesive spray/lotion to aid bag adherence is an indication that there is a stoma related issue requiring a clinical review.
- Advances in bag design include hydrocolloid skin barriers designed to adhere to the skin, withstanding excess moisture production, high stoma output and uneven skin surfaces.
- Adhesive sprays/lotions may result in a build-up of residue left on the skin which is difficult to remove, often requiring additional products for its removal.

Background

- Adhesive sprays/lotions were often used with older stoma appliances to aid security and increase adhesion.
- Historically, patients experiencing excessive sebum or sweating were directed to use adhesive products.
- The use of adhesive sprays/lotions is often as a result of stoma related problems, such as bag leakage or a stoma bag lifting or not lasting.
- Residue left on peristomal skin as a result of using an adhesive can lead to additional products being used to remove this and/or skin cleaned aggressively to clear it of the residue.
