



Prescribing of Elastic Belts Position Statement

Hertfordshire and West Essex ICB recommends a maximum of <u>six</u> elastic belts to be prescribed per patient <u>annually</u>.

Elastic belts are not support belts. They attach to stoma appliances and can add security and help prevent leakage from a stoma appliance.

Recommendations

- Maximum quantity of six elastic belts to be prescribed per patient annually.
- New patients should only be prescribed an elastic belt after an assessment by a stoma care nurse.
- Existing patients should be referred to their local stoma care nurse for review, if ordering in excess of six elastic belts per year.

Rationale

- Elastic belts will stretch out over time and with repeated use.
- Machine washing in a pillowcase, hand-washing, using mild soap, cold water, and drip drying are suggested to add longevity.
- Despite good care, the belts will still need to be replaced throughout the year to ensure effectiveness.

Background

- An elastic belt may help to pull the pouching system towards the abdomen, thereby preventing lifts and leaks.
- Elastic belts are often prescribed with convex stoma appliances where a stoma is flush or difficult to manage.
- There may be occasions where elastic belt use is appropriate with a flat stoma appliance.
- An elastic belt is usually only compatible with the same brand of stoma bag, as they are designed to work together. Therefore, there is no preferred formulary choice for elastic belts.
